Celebrant: Let us pray together:

Almighty and everlasting God, in humility and repentance we bring to you our failures: we bring the pain we have caused others; we bring the injustices of our society in which we participate; we bring our brokenness and our need for healing. We humbly bring our whole selves to you and ask for the transforming power of your grace. Create in us new hearts, O God. Grant us the courage to accept the path to wholeness you offer, that we may walk with you in newness of life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The people are seated for the reading.

2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10

We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see-- we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

so far have you put away our sins from us.


As a father has compassion for his children,

Matthew 6:1-6,16-21

Jesus said, "Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven.

"So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. The Invitation to the Observance of a Holy Lent

Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the season of Lent when we remember Jesus' passion: his arrest, trial, crucifixion and death. During this time and in preparation for the resurrection, the community of Jesus' followers engaged in acts of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time for converts to the faith to prepare for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those who, because of their sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled and restored to the fellowship of the Church.

Thereby, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew our repentance and faith. I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. And, to make a right beginning of repentance, and as a mark of our mortal nature, we now kneel before the Lord our maker and redeemer.


(Silence is kept for a time, all kneeling as you are able or in another posture of reflective prayer)

Imposition of Ashes

The Celebrant prays:

Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth: Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and our longing for you, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. **Amen.**

All those desiring the imposition of ashes come forward to the altar at this time.



At the conclusion of the imposition of ashes, Psalm 51 is prayed responsively.





Psalm 51:1-4, 6-17

O God, give me mercy from your fountain of forgiveness.

I know your abundant love is enough to wash away my transgressions.

Because your compassion is so great, take away the guilt of my wrongdoings.

Forgive the full extent of my rebellious ways, and erase this deep stain on my conscience.

I feel such pain and anguish within me;

I cannot get away from the sting of my sin against you, Lord.

Everything I did, I did right in front of you, for you saw it all.

Against you, and you above all, have I sinned.

Everything you say to me is infallibly true, and your judgment conquers me.

I know that you delight to set your truth deep in my spirit,

So come into the hidden places of my heart and teach me wisdom.

Purify my conscience O God; make me clean again.

Wash me in your love until I am pure in heart.

Satisfy me in your sweetness, and my song of joy will return.

The places within me you have crushed will rejoice in your healing touch.

Hide my sins from your face; erase all my guilt by your saving grace.

Create a new, clean heart within me; put a new, faithful spirit deep inside me.

May you never reject me, O God; may you never take from me your sacred Spirit.

Let my passion for life be restored, tasting joy in every breakthrough you bring to me.

Hold me close to you with a willing spirit that obeys your word.

Then I can show to other guilty ones how loving and merciful you are.

They will find their way back home to you, knowing that you will forgive them.

Spare my life, O God, and save me, and my heart will gladly sing of your deliverance.

Lord God, unlock my heart, unlock my lips, and I will joyously praise you.

For the source of your pleasure is not in my performance or the sacrifices I might offer to you.

The fountain of your pleasure is found in the sacrifice of a repentant spirit, O God; You will not refuse a broken and sorrowful heart.

The Litany of Penitence

The Celebrant and People together, saying:

Most holy and compassionate God: We confess to you and to one another, and to the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth that we have sinned by our own fault in thought, word, and deed; by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.

The Celebrant continues:

We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven; **Have compassion on us, Lord.**

We have been heedless of your call to serve, as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit; **Have compassion on us, Lord.**

We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness: the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives; **We confess to you, Lord.**

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people; **We confess to you, Lord.**

Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves; **We confess to you, Lord.**

Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work; **We confess to you, Lord.**

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to live the faith that is in us; **We confess to you, Lord.**

Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have done: for our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty; **Accept our repentance**, **Lord**.

For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us; **Accept our repentance**, **Lord**.

For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us; **Accept our repentance**, **Lord**.

Restore us, good Lord and accomplish in us the work of your compassion and love; That, having taken this Lenten journey of exile and return, we may be your beloved presence in the world; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Celebrant continues:

Almighty God, the giver of our Lord Jesus Christ, you grieve the distance between us and desire that we turn back to you so that we might enjoy fullness of life. You have given responsibility to your ministers to declare and pronounce to your people, expressing sorrow for our shortcomings, a return from the exile and bondage of our sins. You assure us that all those who are truly ready to turn back to you and strive to amend our lives are forgiven.

Therefore we ask you, O God, to grant us true repentance. We ask that those things which we do on this day may please you, and that the rest of our life we may seek your light, so that at the last we may come to a holy joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Celebrant: The peace of Christ be always with you.

People: And also with you.


The Offertory

People: We lift them to the Lord.


Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

The Celebrant continues:

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation.

Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sin. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Remembering his death and resurrection, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ. Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit and live as Christ's Body in the world.

Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons and all your children, that with your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Celebrant: And now as Christ has taught us, we are bold to say:



Since we cannot receive you today in the Sacrament of your Body and Blood, we pray that you come spiritually into our hearts. Strengthen us with your grace, O Lord, and let us never be separated from you. May we live in you, and you in us, in this life and in the life to come. Amen.

Celebrant: The gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ lived, died, and rose again for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

Wherever you are on your journey, whatever you believe or don't believe, know that you are welcome at this table. For this is Christ's table, and all are welcome.



If you would prefer not to receive the Eucharist, you are welcome to come up for a blessing – cross your hands to your shoulders to indicate this to the priest.
