

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armor of light, now in the time of this mortal life in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Isaiah 64:1-9

O that you would tear open the heavens and come down,

so that the mountains would quake at your presence--

as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil--

to make your name known to your adversaries,

so that the nations might tremble at your presence!

When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect,

For the children and families of Gaywood Elementary School and the guests of the Warm Nights program, for those served by the Bowie Food Pantry and the International Students Office, for all in need, especially those who are poor, those who are hungry, and those who are out of work, we pray:

In a time when so many need healing, we pray for your wholeness, O God. Grace us all with resilience to endure the challenges we face and strengthen us to reach out to one another. For those who suffer, those who are sick, for those on our parish prayer list and those we remember in our hearts, we pray: **Come, O Come Emmanuel.**

In the midst of life, we also face the realities of death. O God who gives comfort, we pray for those who have died, that they find their eternal home with you. *The people may add their own petitions.* For the departed and for all who mourn, we pray: **Come, O Come Emmanuel**.

We pray in thanksgiving to you O God, bringer of joy, especially for those who celebrate birthdays and anniversaries this week. For all the blessings of our lives, we pray:

Come, O Come Emmanuel.

We pray in confidence and hope to you, O Christ, as we await your birth with anticipation and joy. Come Lord Jesus! **Amen.**


The Offertory

You are holy, O God of majesty, and blessed is Jesus Christ. For he is the Word that brought order to chaos, by bringing all things into being and breathing Spirit into the dust.

Christ is the Light that overcame the darkness, shining from the dawn of creation to the daybreak of your eternal realm.

Christ is the Water that quenches our thirst, flowing from the hearts of believers and springing up into eternal life.

Celebrant: The Living Christ is in our midst, and so with Christ we pray:




The Communion


Wherever you are on your journey, whatever you believe or don't believe, know that you are welcome at this table. For this is Christ's table, and all are welcome.
