

Welcome to all present virtually and in person for this service. This booklet contains the prayers and music you will need to participat. The service includes dinner, foot washing, and the celebration of Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples. You are invited to participate in any or all of those elements as you are able and feel comfortable doing so. We are glad you are here tonight and pleased to celebrate this Holy Week with you.

At the sound of the bell please stand as able to sing the opening hymn.

Celebrant:	On this night Jesus broke bread with his followers for the last time and invited them to remember him, to encounter him anew whenever they did the same, saying:
All:	Love one another as I have loved you.
Celebrant:	On this night Jesus took a towel and basin to wash his disciples' feet, saying
All:	Love one another as I have loved you.
Celebrant:	On this night Jesus reminded them that there was no greater love than to lay down
	one's life for one's friends, and he said:
All:	Love one another as I have loved you.
Celebrant: People:	The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Celebrant: Let us pray together the Collect of the Day:

Almighty God, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

The people are seated and words of introduction are spoken. The service continues with the readings.

A Reading from 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

The Prayers of the People

We pray that you would teach us to love and serve one another with Christlike compassion and humility.

As Christ has handed on to us this feast of grace, his body and blood,


We pray that you would help us to share with all who hunger the gifts we have received from you.

The Blessing of the Bread

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

The Celebrant continues

You are blessed, O God of all creation, for you made us in your image to dwell in your infinite love. You have brought us out of bondage into freedom and out of death into life, through the death and resurrection of your Son Jesus. Now as we enter into the mystery of Jesus' life and death, we remember how we offered himself to us without reserve, his body and blood broken and poured out for us.

Those nearest to a loaf of bread hold it up before the celebrant says the following: On the night he was betrayed Jesus took bread, gave thanks, and gave it to the disciples saying "Take, eat; this is my body which is broken for you.

People: We praise you and we bless you, O God.

O God, we ask that you send your Holy Spirit upon this bread, that we who receive it may be a people of hope, justice, and love.

People: We praise you and we bless you O God, you who nourish us and all creation with your goodness, tender love, and mercy.


For those who are in the sanctuary, you may offer a piece of the bread to the person next to you, with the words, "The body of Christ, the bread of heaven." For those participating via Zoom, know that this table extends to whereever you find yourself tonight, and we are all around this table together in Christ. If you have received pre-consecrated bread you may consume it at this point.

All share in the meal.

Please keep respect for the occasion in mind as you make conversation with one another. You might ask the person next to you what brought them here tonight to participate in this service. Those participating virtually are invited to be in conversation with each other and are welcome to eat your evening meal as you converse.

At the conclusion of the meal, all stand as able to sing the gospel hymn

Celebrant:The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.People:Glory to you, Lord Christ.

John 13:1-17, 31b-35

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord--and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, `Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Blessing the Cup

Acolytes carry the trays of wine to the tables.

- Celebrant: We remember that after supper had ended, Jesus took the cup, praised God and shared it, saying, "This is my blood, which is poured out for you; whenever you do this, remember me."
- People: We praise you and we bless you O God, you who nourish the universe with goodness, tender love, and mercy.

All are invited to put out their hands towards the wine as the celebrant blesses it.

Celebrant:	Come upon us, Holy Spirit; come upon these gifts, and make them be for us Christ's
	body and blood.
People:	Make us one body in Christ, on this night of love, and always.
Celebrant:	May Christ come, and may this present world make way for the new.
People:	Hosanna, blessed is the One who comes in the name of our God.

The wine is shared with the words "The blood of Christ; the cup of salvation."

Invitation to the Foot Washing

Celebrant: Servant Lord, on this day we remember your meal with your friends, your words of teaching, and your act of tender love.

People: You Lord of all humble yourself and wash the feet of friend and betrayer alike.

Celebrant: You hold back nothing for our sake and we are awed by your grace. We seek only to be more and more like you each day, taking up a towel and sharing your Word,

People: so that through our love the world will know we follow you. Amen.

Everyone is invited to come forward to one of the stations for foot washing. When you come forward, start by washing the feet of the person seated in one of the chairs; the next person in line will then wash your feet. After your feet are washed you may return to your seat.

While listening to or singing the hymns, those participarting virtually or from their seats are invited to contemplate the act of servanthood Jesus shares with us. You may consider the question: **How can I become more and more like Jesus each day and take up a towel (literally or metaphorically) to serve others?**




Celebrant: And now let us pray in the words our Savior Christ has taught us:


The Clearing of the Tables




Procession to Chapel with Reserved Sacrament
