



Opening Hymn: Hymnal 1982 #679 Surely It Is God Who Saves Me




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Celebrant: Blessed be the one, holy, and living God.






Social Justice Bible Challenge Begins July 27th

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Prayers for Communion in Spirit


Prayer of Thanksgiving
